



What we heard: Quadra Island Open Houses

Area C OCP Project | November 19th and 26th 2026 @ Quadra Island Community Centre

The Strathcona Regional District would like to thank the 95 (approximate) community members who attended the Area C OCP open houses in November. Your many thoughtful comments and dotmocracy have been consolidated.

Participants were asked to show support or lack thereof with a dotmocracy exercise. Dot stickers of 4 different colours were provided. Each colour represented a different level of support for a given OCP objective.

Red – Very important/ agree

Yellow – Important/ somewhat agree

Green – Not very important/ somewhat disagree

Blue – Not important at all/ disagree

Also provided were the existing OCP objectives from various topics, and potential new objective considerations listed side by side for participants to be able to reflect on what is currently included in the OCP and gauge the level of interest on potential new objectives.

The topics covered at the open houses include:

Lastly, each topic area provided space for open ended responses to be written on post-it notes as well as large, printed maps to analyze. The maps provided consisted of existing OCP land use designations, and one of existing parks and trails inventory. The results of the dotmocracy are organized by topic areas below. Open ended comments received are included verbatim.

- Landlord tenancy act is a big problem, with regards, to rentals!

- Settlement ideas. That are “mindful of the capacity of the land to support” Is great but legally we are required to accommodate ever more people how will that work.
- Ensure H2O intensity for existing property owners prior to approving surrounding developments
- The young people cannot afford land - why
- (below previous) Because they need to make it their priority! Work toward it.
- Height restriction in all residential zones to remain the same
- Maintain silviculture designation
- Use development modes to pay for needed island infrastructure
- The south is entirely “sprawl” protect the north
- Encourage multifamily combined with commercial – Q cove and Heriot Bay
- Please keep silviculture designations from existing OCP the same. Do not want to see those greenbelts turned residential
- OCP silviculture is an important aspect of settlement planning on Quadra Island. It maintains a permanent greenspace character and ecosystem services and prevents “logger subdivision”

- Down to 1 acre, producing all farm products allowed

Open Ended Comments:

- Remove all reference to “fin fish aquaculture” definitions, policies, zones. No fish farms allowed. (shellfish ok with rezoning)
- A few old folks are blocking any good changes
- Plan for sea level rise (now irreversible – science) and coastal erosion from more frequent and intense storms. Protect shorelines with nature
- Private land owners enjoyment of quiet and undisturbed vistas should not supersede beneficial commercial use of coastal waters
- Fish farms are a failed concept, biologically unsound, ecologically unsound (feedlots and pathogens), socially unsound (food for the rich, exploiting the poor globally), carnivores consume more meat/ pound – net loss to globe
- Interact with other coastal communities to facilitate healthy, low impact ocean activities
- Enhance and restore eel grass beds as community planting events (working with DFO and HAKAI scientists)

Open Ended Comments:

- Encourage/ allow unique road signs that reflect the “quirkiness” of Quadra, even if Main Road doesn’t officially allow it.
- Protect rural roads as they are; no need to pave every road. I <3 my dirt road
- As a regular cycling commuter. Walking and biking access along our roads would improve safety
- Middle lines on all roads – not subject to whims of road group
- Encourage use bikes, “uber”
- Bold point Road should be paved (up to the lake)
- Campground to Heriot Bay Store Road unsafe (Heriot Bay Road)
- Lower Speed limits in residential areas
- Designated bike lane at edge of roads. Keep veg out back along so cyclists not forced on to road
- Need bike and walking paths around the island
- The project to put ditches on both sides of the road in 2023? Resulted in severe reduction in shoulder width. Probably doesn’t meet standards, and certainly does not feel safe

- “protect and enhance” may not be the best language – limit damage and restore
- We talk a great deal about maintain a rural lifestyle. What does that mean? Consider adding a definition to the OCP. In 20 years the target is to add 630+ homes, will that be rural?
- #4 there are existing activities. No room for growing the items on number 4. At capacity. Especially eco-tourism
- Silviculture zone: remains the same. No changes in OCP or bylaw. 16 ha minimum no exceptions
- Restrict tourism so no over tourism changing the island character.
- Isn’t logging a commercial DEVELOPMENT
- Strathcona (Quadra) was regressive in opting into STR restrictions. Harmful to tourism!
- Campbell River makes Quadra affordable. No one mentions that irony.

Open Ended Comments:

- Bike paths necessary – currently unsafe/ poor shoulders. Speed limits need to be reduced
- Stricter codes for building on the shore and other sensitive areas – ie wetlands etc.
- With public access to the lakes and coastline and watercourses, signage to indicate environmentally sensitive areas (id tidepools) would be helpful and decrease damage to shoreline wildlife
- “protection” is the wrong word, for instance land in parks is great but that does not protect the land from climate change
- Designate park zones g. Bay, Hoskyn Chan, Blenkin etc. Heritage designations

- Promotion British style land use where trails border on go thru. No one thing more important.
- Bike share
- Plaza Road Park – use for something (ie playground, trails, don't leave inactive)
 - o Should have to do something with it within a time frame
- Bicycle walking paths around and between Cove and Heriot Bay (2 red)

Open Ended Comments:

- Strengthen silviculture protection
- OCP silviculture permanent community greenspace. Prevent logging companies from subdividing their properties for development (for ecology and character)
- Enforcement in ESA by the SRD
- Increase access to foreshore at public access points, currently right of ways are largely treated as private property by adjacent landowners.
- This island community considers OCP silviculture protection equivalent in importance to ALR and ESA lands protection (protect nature, no SDS)
- Stop logging old growth and older forests, stop clear cutting, stop cutting in wetland areas, stop selling raw logs

Lastly, one open ended question was asked on its own poster board: **What other topics would you like this OCP to address?** The responses received are listed below.

- Land access is too expensive
- Not cost effective due to infrastructure cost! And MOTI and Tenancy Act *MH Parks
- Remove private lands from Silviculture
- Dark sky policy – beefed up regulation in bylaw to enforce in all zones for all exterior lighting
- Talk honestly and openly about ecological carrying capacity. IF it can't be determined legally or politically – we need to know.
- Protection of silviculture – no rezoning
- Enforce a dark skies policy including banning exterior lighting in yards

- Get quadra out of STR regulation ASAP. An unfair infringement of private property rights
- Dark Sky policy
- No trailer parks (asis) possible tiny homes zone, 5 acre min lot size 8 unit max, on sewer
- Float homes only allowed (as it is now) when connected to services (sewer, water, etc)
- Change language from protection and enhancement to environmental harm reduction and restoration. This is more accurate.
- Land Designations in OCP Needs to be checked to ensure it matches zoning
- Provide access to small-scale secondary suite incentive program *make it affordable for residents to build secondary suites for rental
- Ensure land zoned silviculture remains in that zoning
- Mobile/ modular home park – I've heard many folks say they'd love to move into one with proper management they are not "trailer trash," lovely ones on Vancouver island. Many seniors would love it [2 red, 1 blue]
- Enforcement when issues brought to SRD
- Create separate ocp for the rest of area c, like was promised since day 1 by srd. Outer islands and inlets.
- More public washrooms and showers (red dot)
- Short term rental regulation and oversight
- Tree protection bylaw
- Noise bylaw
